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Identifying eligible students

- ∘ GPA>3.75
- Unique qualifications, e.g.
 research, study abroad
- Encourage students to develop relationships with faculty

Mentoring Exceptional Students

- Substantive experiences
- Graduate level courses
- Publications
- Conference / Presentations
 - First author
 - Co-author
- Leadership in student organizations
 - (NSF) Broader Impacts

Decline writing recommendation

- Can't write positive rec
- Don't know student well

Preparation

- Request the following
 - Application
 - Resume
 - Deadline
 - Essays
 - Interview / long term goals

Format

- 1-2 pages
- Letterhead vs Form
- Consistency
- Confidentiality
- Balanced "team" of letter writers

Details

- How long / what capacity do you know the student
- Comparison to other students
 - Best among xx students / Top xx %
- Verify applicant information
 - Awards, publications
- Expand on information in resume
 - Document activities / GPA

Details

- Provide examples and evidence
 - Qualitative and Quantitative
 - Concrete and Specific
 - Validate personal statement
 - Colleagues' attitudes
 - Awards



- After formal introduction, refer to student by first name
- Narrate a personal interaction
- Recall first impression of student, then contrast with later impression
- Present intriguing asides spontaneous discussions or shared interests
- Describe student's specific contribution to relationship
- Include information about career plans

Specific Attributes

Depend on purpose; may be specified in application

- Medical school
 - work independently, organize a complex project, perseverance, flexibility, energetic, integrity, maturity, personality, promise
- Graduate school
 - motivated, self-directed, ability to complete projects, potential, interpersonal skills
- Employment
 - motivated, self-directed, confident, thorough, conflict management

Strategies

- Word processing
 - Proofread
- Use common paragraphs for same/similar activities
 - Be sure to proof for gender, name, other details
- Use active verbs

High-stakes awards

- Require excellent letters of recommendation
- Exceptionally strong, written from an informed perspective, exude a sincere tone
- Accurate, favorable comparison
 - Best student in xx years
 - Compared to xx students who have accomplished yy



High-stakes awards

Uniqueness: what sets student apart

- Undergraduate research
- Course loads
- Double major
- Study abroad
- Internships
- Community Service

High-stakes awards

- Help reviewers know and admire the candidate
- Avoid hyperbole
- "For more information, please call..." can be interpreted as negative

Common Mistakes

- Not knowing what the student is applying for.
 - "... will be an excellent candidate for your scholarship program."
 - "I am writing to recommend ... for this scholarship to which she is applying."
- Focusing on the student's classroom performance.
 - "... is enrolled in my Introduction to Environmental Studies; her performance in homework assignments, exams and lab reports is consistent and well above the class average."

Common Mistakes

- Focusing on student's ability to show up on time and perform required tasks.
 - Frequently occurs in letters from job supervisors, internship coordinators, and athletic coaches.
- Going on at length about recommender's accomplishments.

Common Mistakes

- Creating a mountain of praise out of a molehill of insignificance.
 - "The environment has been a primary interest to ... since her early years. A few months ago, watching a documentary on penguins with ..., I could see that she was concentrating on every word. It is thus that I can say that ... truly wants to make the world a better place. As an example of her effect on those around her, we are very careful not to run the water when brushing our teeth."
