2017 Freshman Cohort Non-returning Students: What do we know?

Executive Summary

The following report provides an analysis of 478 first-time full-time degree-seeking freshmen in the University of South Alabama (USA) 2017 freshman cohort who did not return to USA in Fall 2018. Of these non-returning students, 181 (38%) transferred to another institution prior to Fall 2018 and 297 (62%) “stopped out” or did not enroll in another college or university.

Results indicated a large majority of transfer students transferred to another public institution located in Alabama. Initial indicators known prior to Fall 2017 to monitor in order to identify students at greater risk to “stop out” instead of transferring to another institution included local students from Mobile or Baldwin County (26%), lived off campus (23%), received a Pell Grant (18%), and obtained a high school GPA of 3.01-3.5 (14%). End of Summer 2018 findings showed a large percentage based differential between students who “stopped out” with a USA GPA of 2.0 or lower (42%) or students with zero to six hours earned at USA (27%) and students who transferred and had a similar USA GPA or a similar number of USA hours earned.

Overview

The following report provides an analysis of 478 first-time full-time degree-seeking freshmen in the University of South Alabama (USA) 2017 freshman cohort who did not return to USA in Fall 2018. The National Student Clearinghouse (NSC) was used to identify whether non-returning students transferred to another institution or “stopped out” and did not enroll in another higher education institution in Fall 2018. While the preference is for students to return and persist at USA, a student who transferred to another institution could be considered a secondary measure of student success.

More than 3,600 colleges and universities in the United States participate in the NSC. With NSC participating institutions enrolling over 98% of all students in public and private colleges and universities in the United States, students who were not identified as transfer students by the NSC were unlikely to be enrolled at another college or university and had “stopped out” of higher education. This report provides comparisons between 181 non-returning students who transferred to another institution prior to Fall 2018 and 297 non-returning students who “stopped out” and did not enroll at another college or university.

Profile of Non-returning Student Who “Stopped Out”

A non-returning student who “stopped out” most likely had the following profile or characteristics:

- Did not participate in Greek life (95%),
- Did not receive a NACAC fee waiver for ACT or SAT test-taking purposes due to meeting one of the indicators of economic need (92%),
- 18 years old (84%),
- Did not attend a USA Day (81%),

- Not a first generation student (77%),
- Took a First Year Experience (FYE) course (72%),
- Participated in a learning community (69%),
- USA GPA of 2.0 or lower at the end of Summer 2018 (68%),
- White (64%),
- No freshman scholarship (63%),
- On probation after Fall 2017 (56%),
- Received a Pell Grant (54%),
- Female (54%),
- No other scholarship¹ (54%),
- Lived on-campus (51%),
- From Mobile or Baldwin County (50%),
- High school GPA of either 3.01-3.5 or 3.51 or higher (39%),
- Earned zero to six USA credit hours at the end of Summer 2018 (36%),
- ACT Composite score of 20 or 21 (26%),
- Received four or more at-risk midterm grades in Fall 2017 (25%), and
- Attended Freshman Session 7 orientation (16%).

Profile of Non-returning Student Who Transferred

A non-returning student who transferred to another institution most likely had the following profile or characteristics:

- Did not receive a NACAC fee waiver for ACT or SAT test-taking purposes due to meeting one of the indicators of economic need (96%),
- Did not participate in Greek life (88%),
- 18 years old (87%),
- Not a first generation student (83%),
- Not on probation after Fall 2017 (80%),
- Did not attend a USA Day (78%),
- Participated in a learning community (77%),
- Took a First Year Experience (FYE) course (77%),
- Lived on-campus (74%),
- White (69%),
- Did not receive a Pell Grant (64%),
- Female (62%),
- No freshman scholarship (56%),
- Received other scholarship (56%),
- High school GPA of 3.51 or higher (53%),
- No at-risk midterm grades in Fall 2017 (49%),
- From rest of Alabama (41%),
- Earned 12.5-18 USA credit hours at the end of Summer 2018 (26%),
- USA GPA of 2.0 or lower at the end of Summer 2018 (26%),
- ACT Composite score of 20 or 21 (22%), and
- Attended Freshman Session 2 orientation (13%).

¹ Military/ROTC, vocational rehab, employment funded, prepaid Alabama, Mississippi, or Florida tuition, etc.

Where Non-returning Students Transferred

Of the 181 non-returning students who transferred, a large majority transferred to an institution with one of the following characteristics (see Table 1 and Table 2). The transfer institution was likely public (95%) and/or located in Alabama (56%). Florida (12%) and Mississippi (10%) were the next most likely state locations of the transfer institution for non-returning students. Non-returning students were also more likely to attend a four-year (55%) institution.

The most common four-year university transfer institutions of choice (see Table 3) were Auburn University (13), Pensacola State College (12), and University of Alabama (9). Of the two-year institutions, Coastal Alabama Community College (14) and Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College (10) were the most common transfer destinations.

Comparison of Non-returning Transfer Students to Students Who “Stopped Out”

Multiple characteristics of non-returning students were compared to determine what characteristics showed a large percentage based differential between 297 non-returning students who “stopped out” compared to 181 non-returning students who transferred. The following table displays characteristics with a percentage based differential of 10% or greater between students who transferred and students who “stopped out” (see Table 4 or complete data tables found in the Appendix).

Results showed the USA GPA after the end of Summer 2018 and the probation status of the student after Fall 2017 were the top two characteristics with subgroups that showed the greatest

differential between non-returning students who “stopped out” and students who transferred. Results showed:

- 68% of the non-returning students who “stopped out” had a USA GPA of 2.0 or lower (190) compared to 26% of non-returning students who transferred (45), 21% of the non-returning students who transferred had a USA GPA of 2.51 to 3.0 (37) compared to 9% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (24), 21% of the non-returning students who transferred had a USA GPA of 3.01 to 3.5 (36) compared to 7% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (19), and 21% of the non-returning students who transferred had a USA GPA of 3.51-4.0 (37) compared to 7% of the non-returning students who “stopped out” (19) and
- 56% of non-returning students who “stopped out” were placed on probation after the Fall 2017 semester (167) compared to 20% of non-returning students who transferred (37).

Six additional characteristics showed a percentage based differential greater than or equal to 10% between students who “stopped out” and students who transferred. The additional characteristics were: 1) number of USA hours earned after the end of Summer 2018, 2) region where the student originated from, 3) number of at-risk midterm grades in Fall 2017, 4) housing (on/off campus), 5) whether the student received a Pell Grant, and 6) high school GPA. Results showed:

- 36% of non-returning students who “stopped out” completed zero to six USA hours earned (101) compared to 9% of non-returning students who transferred (16), 25% of non-returning students who transferred had 24.5 to 30 USA hours earned (44) compared to 8% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (22), and 17% of non-returning students who transferred had 30.5 and more USA hours earned (29) compared to 4% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (12),
- 50% of the non-returning students who “stopped out” came from Mobile or Baldwin County (149) compared to 24% of non-returning students who transferred (43) and 18% of the non-returning students who transferred came from the rest of the United States (32) compared to 5% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (14),
- 49% of non-returning students who transferred had no at-risk midterm grades in Fall 2017 (88) compared to 22% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (66) and 25% of non-returning students who “stopped out” had four or more at-risk midterm grades in Fall 2017 (73) compared to 9% of non-returning students who transferred (16),
- 49% of the non-returning students who “stopped out” lived off campus (146) compared to 26% of non-returning students who transferred (47),
- 54% of the non-returning students who “stopped out” received a Pell Grant (161) compared to 36% of non-returning students who transferred (66), and
- 39% of non-returning students who “stopped out” obtained a high school GPA of 3.01-3.5 (113) compared to 24% of non-returning students who transferred (44) and 53% of the non-returning students who transferred obtained a high school GPA of 3.51 or higher (96) compared to 39% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (114).

Implications

Results showed a large percentage based differential between students who “stopped out” with a USA GPA of 2.0 or lower at the end of Summer 2018 (42%) and students who completed zero to six USA hours earned at the end of Summer 2018 (27%) compared to non-returning students who transferred. These students may have benefited from programs such as intrusive advising and peer mentoring to improve their likelihood of persistence at USA or to prepare them to transfer to another institution. While the preference is to encourage USA freshmen students to continue and persist at USA, a student who successfully transfers to another institution could also be considered a secondary measure of success compared to a complete “stop out” from higher education.

The findings also showed initial indicators known prior to Fall 2017 to monitor in order to identify students at greater risk to “stop out” instead of transferring to another institution included local students from Mobile or Baldwin County (26%), lived off campus (23%), received a Pell Grant (18%), and obtained a high school GPA of 3.01-3.5 (14%). Students with these characteristics were less likely to transfer to another institution and should be targeted early with interventions to help them persist and return to USA.
